## PASTOR'S POINT—RU PRAYING FOR RAIN?

When Kathy and I were camping near San Luis Obispo last month, we noticed that the surrounding hills and volcanic morros looked browner and drier than we had ever seen them before. Several conversations with local residents turned up some sobering statistics:

- ✓ The total rainfall there since December 1st is less than 1/2 inch. December is usually their wettest month.
- ✓ Local reservoirs are drawn down to a fraction of their full capacity. Lake San Antonio, which supplies the Salinas Valley, is into the single digits. Lake Nacimiento, which serves SLO County, isn't much better at around 20% of capacity.
- ✓ Last year's total rainfall was a little over 4 inches. Typical average yearly rainfall is over 20 inches.

The first Sierra snow survey of the winter, taken near South Lake Tahoe in January, found mostly bare ground. Electronic measurements showed the water content in the statewide snowpack at just 20% of average for this time of year.

Without significantly more precipitation, the state estimates it will be able to deliver only 5% of the water requested by 29 public agencies in 2014.

San Francisco and Los Angeles are the driest that they've been in 100 years, says Bill Croyle, a state drought manager. Since Governor Brown has declared a drought emergency, California will be eligible to draw more water from Lake Mead behind Hoover Dam, which also supplies the cities of Las Vegas and Phoenix.

Back on January 10, the California Council of Roman Catholic Bishops called on people of all religious faiths to join in prayers for rain.

Then on January 19, Muslim worshippers at the Islamic Center of San Gabriel Valley included special prayers for rain, called *Salatul Istisqa*.

In its press release the Islamic Center explained, "Islam's Prophet Muhammad offered similar prayers during times of drought."

For example: "O God, give us a saving rain, good and productive, general and heavy, now and not later, beneficial and not harmful."

We don't hear very much about Methodists praying for rain, at least not in California. Yet there is a solid Biblical precedent for a prayer/rain linkage.

Consider James 5.17-18: "Elijah was a man just like us. He prayed earnestly that it would not rain, and it did not rain on the land for 3 1/2 years. Again he prayed, and the heavens gave rain, and the earth produced its crops."

In the Old Testament, drought is viewed as an indicator of God's wrath against a disobedient people. (see Deuteronomy 28.22)

We believe in a God who is powerful yet merciful, who so loved the world that he gave his only Son. (John 3.16) Wouldn't our God respond to passionate prayers for rain just as He responds to passionate prayers for blessing, healing, peace and forgiveness?

Perhaps 2014 will be the year for our faith communities to lead the way for our nation to repent and turn back to God, the maker and giver of all things—even the clouds and the rain.

If you're willing, please add prayers for a **saving rain year** to your list of intercessions. This is a praying church; pray expecting powerful answers from God.

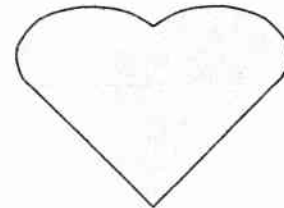

### Young Adult Nicaragua 2014



Looking for a few good young adults!

Have you been to SSP, and would like to go again? Do you like to do volunteer work, travel, and meet new people? Are you a young adult? (sorry for us young-at-heart – this is also “physical age”!) Do you know a young adult who might be interested?

Sierra Service Project (SSP) Nicaragua (separate from our UMY SSP trip this summer) invites young adults (roughly defined as 18 to 26) to journey to Central America for a 10 day mission trip from June 21 to 1 July 2014.

#### More about the mission trip:

SSP is partnering with Seeds of Learning (SOL) to send a team to learn and serve in Nicaragua. The mission trips are designed to expose young adults to the realities of rural communities in Central America, highlighting both their strengths and their challenges, to partner with the local community, forming relationships, building bridges and exploring one another’s cultures while constructing or improving a school building.

Seeds of Learning has over twenty years of experience working in several communities in Nicaragua. Their focus is on education. A portion of the volunteer fee supports a donation to Seeds of Learning’s scholarship and teacher education programs.

Cost: \$1500 plus airfare. Some scholarships and fundraising opportunities are available.

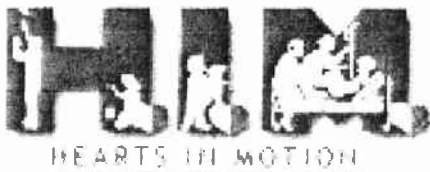
## Guatemala Mission Trip Rummage Sale

Dear Church Family,

On behalf of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation, the Frisbee family would like to thank our United Methodist Church family for the wonderful support. Thank you especially for your prayers for Taylor and Isabella throughout the last seven years. Also, thank you to those of you who came out to our December 7<sup>th</sup> Walk at CCCC. We had the most attendees ever, with a wonderful showing of students from our local schools. As of this date, the Ridgecrest CF Walk raised almost \$35,000. Of that total, members of our church family donated at least \$5,500, both through the church, at the Walk, and online. Each year, we learn of another adult or child in our community who also daily battles with this hereditary disease. In the spring of 2013, a baby was born in the Ridgecrest Hospital and was immediately identified as having cystic fibrosis. Thanks to donations to the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation, a CF test was developed, and babies born in all of our fifty states, receive this test prior to leaving the hospital.

The Frisbee family greatly appreciates your support of CF research that is helping those with cystic fibrosis to have a better quality of life and to live longer. The hope is one day a cure will be found. Once again, thank you very much!
